

Agave Care Guide

Thank you for purchasing an agave from DJA Plants. Your agave was grown from seed in our greenhouse in Cheshire. With the correct care it will grow with you and be a part of your life for many years to come.

Light – Agave originate from the American continent where they receive a lot of light so your new agave is going to want to live in a really bright spot in your home for it to really flourish.

Water – Between April to September only. When light levels and temperature drops your agave will have a little rest (and we all need rest time!) so don't water over winter.

As a general rule, water when the soil is dry and not just looks dry but is dry all the way through. If your agave is continually in damp soil the roots will rot and your agave will die.

Like most of us, your agave loves nothing more than a good drink. So, when you do water don't be stingy, don't only add a tiny amount of water and please do not mist your agave ever. During the growing season (April – September) water every 7-10 days or when the compost has completely dried out. Water until the it starts to come out of the bottom of the pot (you may want to ensure your agave is sitting in a dish or on the draining board when you do this) if any water is in the dish after 1 hour empty it into the sink. Your agave will now be happy for another week or two. You may want to make a little note on your calendar when you watered as although agave can withstand long periods with no water if you want to optimise growth you need to water regularly.

Feeding – Although agave can live without being fed if you want optimal growth I would recommend feeding it once a month with a specialist succulent feed which is available from most garden centres or online shopping platforms.

Going on holiday – If you go on holiday or work away from home of course your agave will miss you greatly but it will survive, water before you go and it will be waiting eagerly for your return when you can water it again. No need to leave it in the bath on a damp towel or have your mom come round to water.
